INC Awards: The Real Prize Is Parks


Park Advocates John Case And Dave Felice Honored As INC's Outstanding Good Neighbors

When you think of "good neighbors," consider the significance and impact of parks in your Valley neighborhood. INC — the *Inter-Neighborhood Cooperation* — did just that giving its highest honors at the annual Awards Dinner to *Friends of Denver Parks*, John Case and Dave Felice.

Case — an attorney with the law firm of Benson & Case — was presented the President's Award — an honor not presented each year. Case is donating his legal expertise to Friends of Denver Parks, an organization that is opposing the City of Denver in Denver District Court and the Colorado Court of Appeals. The attorney and Friends of Denver Parks are fighting to preserve 11 acres within Hampden Heights North Park. The City traded the parkland for an office building.

Felice — who received the Outstanding INC Delegate Award — was recognized for his active participation in INC affairs, particularly the Parks and Recreation Committee On the marks in the Parks and Recreation committees.

A silent auction benefited INC's 18-year history of distributing dictionaries and thesauruses to every third grader enrolled in Denver Public Schools.
